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onald Abels was only 16 when he committed his first armed robbery and started selling drugs. He was intent on being the top gangster in his community of Capricorn Park, Cape Town. But when he met some people who surprised him with their love, affection and trust, he started to realize there might be more to life. Now he runs an organization for children from marginalized communities and his life has drastically changed.

In an interview with Thislife Online, Ronald shares that he was raised by his grandparents and as a child he dreamt of becoming a policeman.

"But when my hormones kicked in, I noticed the gangsters attracted the coolest girls and I decided to become the greatest gangster of all," he recalls. "So at the age of 15 I started fighting with the oldest boys in my school."

He made a name for himself as a gangster and took over an existing

Although Ronald wasn't taking drugs at the time, he started selling them to make money. After he finished school, he thought he was living the gangster high life.

"Then the first white missionaries came to Capricorn. I'd never seen a white person up close before and suddenly this white English woman walked right up to me and just hugged me. I didn't understand why! Later, when I got to know Julie, she told me when she

noticed me standing there in my fake leather jacket and gangster attitude, she simply saw someone who needed love.

"That was the first time someone had hugged me. I loved my grandparents. They were good to us and looked after us well, providing everything we needed, but they weren't affectionate people.'

Ronald began attending the Christian home group that Julie and her husband Mike ran.

One night they invited him for

supper but when he arrived, they told him they had to go away for the weekend.

"They handed me their house keys and said I should spend the weekend there. Again, they'd taken me by surprise and I didn't understand how they could trust me. My first thought was that I'd steal everything of value, but I was so completely captivated by their love and trust that I didn't even smoke cigarettes in their yard."

Ronald decided to convert to Christianity and tried to be a "good

It was a big change from the gangster life where he was always fighting, living in fear, running from the law and sure he would be murdered.

"Twice I escaped plots to kill me," he remembers.

"The first time I was hijacked and held captive over a weekend while I was made to dig my own grave. I persuaded them to let me join them when they were smoking tik [methamphetamine, or crystal meth] and they started to see me as one of them. The second time, I refused to go somewhere I was supposed to be and someone else was mistaken for me and shot dead." Ronald's attempt to be a "good guy" didn't

"Eventually I took up alcohol again and started living a double life. I realize now that I was just subscribing to a set of religious rules at this stage and Jesus had not yet become real to me."

He started smoking tik again and withdrew from his Christian friends.

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The blind men and the elephant

THERE is a popular analogy used to show that all religions are valid ways to describe God. Religion professors especially love this philosophic analogy, because it equalises all religions, making all religions equally "true" in their description of

God. The analogy is this: there are four blind men who discover an elephant. Since the men have never encountered an elephant, they grope about, seeking to understand and describe this new phenomenon. One grasps the trunk and concludes it is a snake. Another explores one of the elephant's legs and describes it as a tree. A third finds the elephant's tail and announces that it is a rope. And the fourth blind man, after discovering the elephant's side, concludes that it is, after all, a wall.

Each in his blindness is describing the same thing: an elephant. Yet each describes the same thing in a

radically different way.

According to many, this is analogous to the different religions of the world - they are describing the same thing in radically different ways. Thus one should conclude that no individual religion has a corner on truth, but that all should be viewed as essentially equally valid. This is a powerful and

provocative image, and it certainly seems to capture something of the truth.

If God is infinite and we are finite, it is reasonable to believe that none of us can fully capture His nature. But does this philosophic analogy demonstrate the truth that all religions lead to God? To conclude that it does would ignore several points...

First, there is a fact of the matter: the elephant. What the blind men are attempting to describe is, in fact, an elephant, not something else. Just so, there are factual questions regarding God.

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"I reconnected with my old gang for protection and went back to selling drugs. I made money but smoked all the profit and couldn't buy drugs to sell... I became homeless, hanging around drug houses and sleeping wherever I could.'

Hopeless and lonely, Ronald recalls sitting in front of a rubbish pile thinking there must be more to life. He no longer

wanted to be part of the gangster life.

"In that moment of utter despair I heard a voice softly say, 'Ronald, it's time to go home'. I believe it was the voice of Jesus."

Ronald obeyed the voice and returned to his childhood home.

"I was filthy, had lice, stank and was exhausted. It took about three baths to get me clean. I slept for days. As I recovered, I joined a local church. The first time I'd converted it had been to the idea of Christianity. This time I included Jesus. Now I was in an active relationship with Him. That's when it got real for me... I've never felt lonely since. I realize I was always looking for love. Jesus fills me completely. He's the one I count on. He always has my best interests at heart.'

Ronald started attending church, and quickly became an intern. The church helped him attend Bible College and in 2016 he became the church's full-time Missions Developer.

He also founded Future Life Ministries, which helps young people from marginalized communities in Cape Town.

Ronald is now married to Sydney, an American missionary. He also spends time with his two daughters from a previous relationship.

"One of the greatest gifts Jesus has given me is a restored relationship with them, and I love being able to offer them a secure home when they're with me," he shares.

"I read, watch television, go to movies, normal things. I'm never afraid. I've been told that I'm regarded as a symbol of hope in Lavender Hill now. They say that if God could change me, He can change anyone. I agree!"

FREEDOM FROM ADDICTION

o everyone else, South African Margaret Van Rooyen's family seemed happy. But behind closed doors Margaret and her mother lived in fear of her rigid and emotionally abusive father, whom she says was also manipulative and very strict.

She rebelled when she hit her teens and tells Challenge News she "went deep into worldly behaviour. I drank heavily, smoked, did drugs and became sexually immoral."

All the while she continued to attend church, but admits she did it "purely out of habit" and not because God meant anything to her. It wasn't always like that though. Margaret shares that she had grown up in church and Sun-

day School and had committed her life to Jesus Christ when she was seven. "My mother was deeply involved in church activities and I followed in her footsteps."

However, all that early learning fell by the wayside as she entered adulthood and continued her selfdestructive lifestyle - which brought her nothing but bouts of depression and severe panic attacks.

All that changed when Margaret was 26. She was living with her boyfriend at that time and says she "encountered the Holy Spirit" quite suddenly and unexpectedly. "God pressed my heart and called me to come back to Him.'

She began to read the Bible and says, "He showed me in His Word that the life I was leading was not what He wanted for me. I could feel the Holy Spirit come heavily on me and I started to cry.

"I cried out all the pain and then the Lord strengthened me to do the right thing.'

That "right thing" was to leave her boyfriend and move back to her parents' house for a fresh start. "It was a hard thing to do but because I honoured God and chose Him above the life I was living, He in turn honoured me and later gave me a husband - He even allowed me to meet him exactly the way I wanted!"

She says God also provided the funds for her to go to Bible college, where she graduated and became a preacher.

Margaret says she is now a completely different person.

"In the past four years I have, with the help of the Holy Spirit, stopped smoking, sexual immo-

rality and drinking. Even the way I speak has changed. "Freedom from the addictions that ruled my life is the best part of becoming a Christian."

The hardest part, she sighs, is seeing people rejecting God. "It breaks His heart."

Today Margaret is a student preacher and is happily married to a Christian man. She says she is a successful businesswoman whose purpose is to mentor and guide other young women. She shares her life story as one of hope and encouragement that the Word of God, planted in a young heart, never goes to waste.

"Being raised in church gave me a foundation of truth. Even when you wander away from God you will return and the Lord will receive and restore you with open arms. My story is not just one of salvation but of restoration. I am the prodigal daughter."

The blind men and the elephant

"Does God even exist?" is a question of fact, much like, "Was Abraham Lincoln ever President of the United States?" If so, it would be true whether anyone believes it or not, and to deny it, one would be mistaken. Thus, not all opinions, whether concerning elephants or the nature of God, are equally true.

Second, all four blind men are, in fact, mistaken. It is an elephant and not a wall or a rope or a tree or a snake. Their opinions are not equally true -- they are equally, and actually false. At best, such an analogy of religious pluralism would show that all religions are false, not true.

Third, and most importantly, the philosophic analogy does not take into account any kind of special revelation.

If a fifth man were to arrive on the scene, one who could see (and who was able to demonstrate his credentials of having sight), and he was to describe

the elephant as an elephant, then it would change the analogy entirely.

Jesus Christ, unique among all religious leaders of history, claimed to be such a "fifth man," a definitive revelation of God. Many of the people who watched Jesus' miracles and heard Him speak were offended by His clear statements about His deity. "This was why [they] sought all the more to kill Him, because He not only broke the Sabbath but also called God His own Father, making Himself equal with God" (John 5:18).

Jesus however, invited us to believe in Him if we want our search for God satisfied... "I am the bread of life; he who comes to Me shall not hunger, and he who believes in Me shall never thirst" (John 6:35).

Want to check out Jesus' reliability to be this "fifth man"? Read Lee Strobel's book A Case for Christ.

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Saving kids with I FOUND

rom poor rural Irish beginnings, dyslexic and raised by foster parents during WW2, Ray Barnett has made lifting children out of poverty his life's mission. And he has done it with a song in

Now in his eighties, Ray has been all over the world intervening in dangerous situations to rescue orphans, feed the hungry and intercede for the release of hostages.

his heart!

His autobiography Don't Tell Me it Can't be Done, tells his exhilarating story

that takes place in areas of the world that most people would avoid, negotiating with powerful people.

In the early 1980s, after Ray had already successfully brokered some difficult situations, he read in Life magazine about the "lost boys" of Sudan. Five thousand orphans were sent to Ethiopia, but were not accepted and turned back. One thousand were lost, but the rest ended up in Southern Sudan.

Ray decided he wanted to find them and help them, which he did. His humanitarian organisation, called Friends in the West, set up a school, and got food and support from over the border in Kenya. All the boys eventually got immigration status to leave for America and Canada.

"I'd been involved in Idi Amin's Uganda, when half a million Christians were put to death. I

went back during the Ethiopian famine which was impacting Uganda, which was in a civil war. The Ugandan prime minister asked me to go to Lueuro, the killing fields of Uganda, to help there," he recounts.

While there Ray was so discouraged by the pictures of the emaciated Ethiopian and Ugandan children, but he

wanted to showcase their potential. The idea just came: why not start an African children's choir?

In 1981, two years before, while driving in Uganda, Ray's group had given a little boy a lift in the car, and asked him if he could sing.

"The child sang a beautiful chorus to us, and we recorded it. The image of this bright, beautiful, articulate child is what people needed to see. I said to the prime minister: 'You're in a civil war and a famine. How can we get passports and visas for these orphans to come to Western countries?' He said: 'I'll get the passports; you get the visas.

"In 1984, our first tour came to the UK and Canada. There's never been a day since when there hasn't been one of our choirs touring somewhere in the world," Ray smiles.

The break the children get in life from being in the choirs – the health care, regular food, education, travel

and life experience, and love and nurturing have led to many wonderful success stories.

"I'm proud to say that one boy is now a specialist doctor at Yale. His brother became a teaching consultant in Kampala, and the other is one of East Africa's leading civil engineers. Another of our children

is the top anchorman in Kenya, and another baby, the sole survivor in a Rwandan massacre, is now a nurse in the American air force. If I need a doctor, a lawyer, I can call up one of my children!" Ray jokes.

He has been the legal guardian for every child.

"We put them through university as far as they can go. Now we're working with a major-general in the Marines to provide an ongoing mentorship program for them. Every one of our children has performed for queens, presidents and at major events and on prestigious stages."

Music was Ray's lifesaver too. It was a music teacher who first realised that he was dyslexic and got him the help he needed, showing the little boy the first kindness he had ever known.

The second thing that revolutionised Ray's life was when he was asked at 13 if he was a Christian. He answered that he had always gone to Sunday School.

"To which they replied that I needed to be born again, and told me the story of Nicodemus. [A Bible story about a religious man who had a late night talk with Jesus, who explained that being born again did not mean a second natural birth but a spiritual birth into new life with God. (John chapter 3.)]

"I went home to my bedroom and asked the Lord Jesus to come into my life. I was inspired by the story of David Livingstone [a missionary explorer into Africa], but while I aspired to be like him, I never dreamed I'd work in Africa and help

Through his work with the choir, Ray has been able to raise millions of pounds to establish numerous schools throughout Africa that serve children who would otherwise have no chance at an education.

He has also been able to raise significant money for emergency relief and development programs in Somalia, Sudan and Rwanda, and more recently to help orphaned children in South Africa who are battling hunger and disease.

Ray, whose wife died a few years ago, lives with his children and grandchildren in Vancouver.

"I am happiest when someone finds faith in Christ," he says.

"A motto that changed my thinking is: Worship is not just when we are on our knees. Worship is every action we take during the day."



"I grew up very poor," Judeit shares

with Challenge News. "I'm the third of five children. My parents weren't married and my father left my mother after the fifth child."

Judeit's father's only involvement with her family was the small amount he paid in child support. "The child support was R300 and our only income and we had to survive with only that money.'

Judeit's mother didn't work and began drinking a lot.

"We had to sometimes sit with her at shebeens until 2-3am," she recalls. "We never had our own home so we stayed with other people, either in a room or a hut in the backyard. Once my mother and three brothers stayed in the car for a few months."

At around the age of 10 or 11, Judeit began drinking alcohol and smoking. "I sometimes smoked weed also," she admits. "I then later did all of this with my mother." As Judeit grew older, she felt hopeless and unloved.

"When I was a teenager, I struggled a lot with low self-esteem. I never had any dream for myself and my future."

She would lay awake in bed at night, wondering, "Why us? Why do we have to go through this?'

Everything changed for Judeit in 2001 when she visited a Christian church. "That's where I heard the good news about Jesus," Judeit recalls. Before this she had heard of church and Jesus - "but I didn't understand what it all meant," she says.

Now, hearing about Jesus and the sacrifice He made for her on the cross, Judeit saw hope for her life for the first time.

"I was so lost and desperate and hungry for change that I had no other option but to give my life to God," she remembers. "I was in church on a Sunday morning, and the altar call was made. Then I decided enough is enough. And I stepped out and gave my life to Jesus... Since becoming a Christian, I've overcome a lot of my issues, like the low self-esteem. I know now that I'm loved, because Jesus died for me.

Despite not finishing school, Judeit now works as an administration manager and is responsible for two stores. She also trained administration staff for two other stores. She and her husband own their own home.

"I have two daughters aged 18 and 11 and a husband and all of us serve the Lord," Judeit shares. "The best part about being Christian is knowing that my life is in God's hands and I can do all things through Jesus, who gives me strength; and just to know Him and serve Him."

Judeit's message for those who are struggling with feelings of hopelessness is that, "Jesus is alive and He wants to give us a good life."

"It is the best decision anyone can ever make to choose Jesus. I'm not saying that this road is easy, but I can say it is worth it. My life is a living testimony of what God can do with a girl who didn't have any dreams. He took me out of my situation, polished me and showed me that He is God. He gave me a life that I never could imagine. God worked with me on my emotional scars. I now can say I've overcome a lot of my issues. God heals the broken - ask me - I know!"

Judeit says her church leaders guided her on the path to healing.

"I thank God for placing them in my life," she says.

ercy Muzeza's life was all about pretence. The 68-year-old Zimbabwean florist recalls how her childhood was spent playing a part to keep her parents happy.

"My parents went to church and they forced my sister and me to be Christians, so I just pretended to be," she tells Challenge News.

"I was about 10 years old when I first heard about God but it did not mean anything to me. My childhood was not bad but I was not good."

Life was not happy for Mercy, who says she grew up dogged by jealousy, short-temperedness, lying and unforgiveness.

It wasn't until after she got married and had four children that the faith she had faked as a child became real to her.

Five years ago she "became a true believer in God," she shares. "Now I want Jesus to stay in me and never leave me and I want to stay in Him as well."

She says that since re-dedicating her life to God she is "no longer connected to those other habits" and that all her children and her husband have also committed their lives to Jesus Christ. "We see God's hand in our family and we are so happy to be His children."

Sharing that there have been "big

changes" in her life since then, she says she rejoices in Christ. "I am safe in Him in my daily life and also in the life to come. I rejoice because I have eternal life."

Mercy, who worked for her local church after becoming a Christian, says it's not a bed of roses though. "You are always mocked and you have people laughing about you. They call you names as well."

But her favourite Bible passage, which is Psalm 23, gives her comfort during those tough times, affirming that "the Lord is my Shepherd and He makes me to lie down in green pastures."

Mercy, a Covid-19 survivor, says it's only by the grace of God that she is still alive. "Jesus gave me another chance to live. I praise God because most of my relatives passed on."

hamzell Sampson's childhood is split into two parts - the happy early years, and the years after her parents' marriage ended.

She describes her childhood growing up in Worcester, Western Cape, as normal until the day her mother discovered her father had been unfaithful.

"When that came to light, everything changed drastically," she tells Challenge News. "Fights between my mother and father were very traumatising. Alcohol played a big role in these fights."

Thamzell's father abandoned his family when she was 11. While her mother was present physically, the pain of rejection changed her.

"This basically forced me to grow up," Thamzell recalls. "I was a very shy girl. I dealt with a lot of anger and rejection because of my father walking out. I had a very low selfesteem as well."



She attended church with her aunt, who was a Sunday School teacher

"The first time I really heard about God was when my cousin committed her life to Jesus and she introduced God to me," Thamzell remembers. "They had regular home group meeting at my grandmother's home."

Thamzell recalls the moment she became a Christian as a 12-year-old

"I prayed the Sinner's Prayer [see page 7 for an example] and committed my life to Jesus," she shares. Thamzell knew God had chosen her.

Sixteen years on, she says many things have changed since then.

"My biggest change I would say is the way I see myself. Where I had low self-esteem, looking down at myself, I now have so much boldness and confidence in myself. I know who I belong to, and who my Father is. I'm a child of God. Knowing who I am gave me a lot of assurance and boldness."

Thamzell says she endeavours to daily renew her mind as it says in Romans 12:2, "Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is - His good, pleasing and

perfect will." She says sometimes this is hard to do with everything going on in the world.

"However, the best part is that the grace (undeserved love) of God is sufficient for us each and every day," Thamzell says.

She tells others, "Jesus will meet you right where you are. Jesus loves us just the way we are. I have found that you do not have to be at a certain point in your life to be good enough for Jesus."

Her favourite Bible verse 1 Corinthians 16:13-14, "Be on your guard; stand firm in the faith; be courageous; be strong. Do everything in love."

"Jesus loves you," she shares. "Many times in life we seek for something or someone to belong to. But we are created in God's image. Therefore you are His creation and you belong to Him. If you have tried the same."

HOLINESS is not really a concept bandied about much in our culture today. If the term is used, it would most likely be negatively, as in "Stop being so holier-than-thou!" Meaning, "stop being so self-righteous", or "stop judging me for my bad behaviour".

'Holiness', as far as our culture understands it, is something we think we ought to avoid in order to make others feel better about themselves. Even exercising a free choice, like not drinking alcohol, not swearing or not sleeping with someone can be construed as some sort of superspiritual behaviour depending on the company, and elicit an accusation of being too 'holy'.

In the Bible, however, the word 'holy' in the Hebrew language means 'things belonging to God'.

Things and people are 'made holy' by dedicating them for use by and

When God shows up somewhere, like in the Jewish temple or at Moses' burning bush, He transforms that space into a holy place. Even coal shovels and candlesticks can be holy, because they are set aside for use in God's service.

Other words that convey that special use for God's purposes are 'sanctified' or 'consecrated'.

The New Testament calls Christians "a holy people".

Looking around at those who follow Jesus that you know, you might disagree. But the point is that they are not holy because of what they do, they are holy because they belong to God and God is using them for His purposes.


Christians should indeed act in a manner that is upright and sin-free, but that comes out of the identity of holiness that God has already given them by forgiving their sin and accepting them as His children, not out of a striving on their part to become 'good enough' for God.

The Christian God, Yahweh, is perfect, sinless and all good. God's standards are high and holy. Apart from Jesus' atoning [paying the debt] sacrifice on the cross there is no way humans could meet them.

However, with Jesus as both Saviour and Lord of their lives. Christians are empowered to live holy lives — not sanctimonious lives, but lives full of humility, love, kindness, patience and self-control.

You too can be holy and live holy, no matter how you have lived up to this point. You can change the script of your life by committing yourself to God by means of a simple prayer such as the one on this page.

STRENGTH IN WEAKNESS

n 2017, Sheffield policeman Phil Roberts was crowned Britain's Strongest Man.

Winning this competition was no mean feat. The 32-year-old had to beat his opponents in events such as flipping a 400 kg tractor tyre, lifting a car and pulling a plane. At 1.9 metres tall and weighing 133 kg, he was built like a mountain.

Yet while he was as physically as strong as they came, emotionally Phil was as weak as a child.

"It looked on the outside that I had everything, but I didn't feel fulfilled," he says on the YouTube channel Life Stories. "I felt empty."

Emptiness had plagued him ever since he was 22, when his best friend hanged himself. Until then Phil had been a casual churchgoer, but this tragedy caused him to turn his back on God.

"I couldn't understand how a good God could allow that to happen and that's when I decided I was done with God and would live my life my way to the full — or at least what I thought was to the full," he says. "I can't say I'm proud of the next 13 years."

Those were the party years, the hard drugs (cocaine, heroin, lots of steroids) and hard drinking years. He even got engaged and bought a house with his fiancée but was unfaithful to her and they broke up.

By this time Phil was a police officer, but had become disillusioned with the job and chalked up the most complaints of anyone in the South Yorkshire Police Force.

Where did it go wrong, he asked himself? "I went from wanting to help and protect the vulnerable to being one of the most violent men in the force. I left a trail of disaster behind me and slipped into depression."

Phil tried to pick himself up by throwing himself into weight training and competing in novice strongman competitions.

Bolstered by some early victories, he went all out to win the major titles, which resulted in his 2017 win. This launched him into the glamorous world of women, sports cars, penthouse apartments and lucrative sponsorship deals.

But still this brought him no lasting joy — instead he describes his success as hollow. His use of hard drugs, which included copious amounts of steroids, continued.

In 2019, Phil decided to defend his title. By this time, he weighed 152 kg.

"I was having the worst competition I've ever had. I was so big and so uncomfortable because I put on that weight very quickly.

"The steroids and recreational drugs I was taking put my body under huge pressure — it's by the grace of God that I didn't just pop."

The last event of the competition rolled around — the Atlas stone lift, in which competitors have to lift five huge round stones, increasing in weight from 100 to 160 kg, and place them on five high platforms.

He got through the first four but

slipped while lifting the final and heaviest stone. It dropped. The 160 kg rock crashed onto Phil's shin bone, which broke with a sickening crack.

"I knew instantly it was bad," he says. "It sounded like a massive branch breaking off a tree."

When surgeons told him his injuries were so severe he could lose his leg, Phil's world disintegrated.

"I went from being one of the strongest people on earth to the vulnerable little boy I was growing up. I was terrified," he shares.

"All I could think of was that I would lose my business and my livelihood. I realised everything I'd built my life on, things that never gave me real happiness or joy in the first place, could vanish overnight."

However, Phil had some friends who were Christians. They reached out to him during this time and invited him to a Christian men's retreat.

"At that point I was so desperate I said I'd take anything, so I went, but this time I wasn't my confident cocky self. I was in pain; my leg was being held together by this massive cage. I was miserable."

While he was there, one of the speakers approached Phil and said to him: "Why don't you give this God thing a go? Give Jesus a chance."

Willing to try anything, he said to himself: "Yeah, why not give Jesus a go?" It really was as casual as that!

He says slowly but surely things started to change. "I didn't know much about God at all. I thought He was cruel and Jesus was just some kind of nice guy.

"I knew I had to change — I wanted to change — but I was kind of straddling the Christian life and the old life. But God was so gracious; He was so patient. He gave me grace [undeserved love]. He is a loving father, the best Father ever.

"I can genuinely say today that on reflection the day of the accident was the best day of my life, though not at the time, of course. But it was when I realised that all these things that you've spent so much time and effort on can be taken away from you in an instant.

"God has given me the purpose and meaning I've always looked for."
