

Devout disco diva

The Seventies were the golden age of disco and the queen of the scene, Gloria Gaynor, enjoyed fame from her hit songs “Never Can Say Goodbye” and “I Will Survive”.

Nobody in the audience could have guessed her beaming smile masked a past of pain, abuse, and hurt. Gloria didn’t want to think about it so she would spend her nights in New York’s gay clubs, smoking dope and drinking.

“I knew that after I had finished playing I was going to get up the next day and be drinking champagne from morning to night, partying and carrying on,” she says. “I suffered desperately from low self-esteem, and felt I needed to do these things so everyone could see me as one of them.”

Beginning when she was just five, Gloria had been sexually abused by people she thought she could trust.

She never really knew her father as he had left before she was born. She remembers seeing him four times between the ages of five and 19 and then not again until she was 35 – although she did reconnect with him later. “I just wanted my father,” she says wistfully.

What she lacked in a father she had in a superwoman of a mother, who raised her seven children alone. “I suppose it was frightening for her. But she was a brave woman. And if she had any fears, we didn’t know about them.”

Gloria’s mother faithfully took her children to church every Sunday and taught them the principles and morals of the Bible but, “that’s all we knew. For as long as I could remember, I had prayed every night for all my family and friends. But I didn’t know who Jesus was.”

For Gloria and her siblings, music and singing were much more interesting. “Our home was always full of music!” she smiles. “I was always surrounded by it. All through my young life I wanted to sing.”

Her first taste of public performing came when she graduated from high school and joined a local band. In 1973, she was signed on to Columbia Records.

She released her debut album *Never Can Say Goodbye* in 1975 and became a household name overnight. The glitz and glamour of newfound fame seemed inviting and exciting.

Then, her mother passed away and Gloria was devastated. “I kind of lost my compass and was trying to be in with the crowd,” she recalls. “I’d always been a wallflower. I started trying to live up to the expectations of my audience, to be this star among all of the other stars, and to have all these friends. But it wasn’t really me.”

In March, 1978, she fell over a monitor while dancing on stage and

woke up the next day paralysed from the waist down. Multiple surgeries later, she was able to walk again but the road to a full recovery was long and difficult.

“I had lost everything, I wasn’t working, I had no income,” she explains. In desperation she cried out to the God of her childhood: “God, please. I don’t know what’s going to happen to me. You’ve got to do something.”

Her prayers seemed answered when she made a glorious comeback months later with her single “I Will Survive.” It became a global phenomenon, squashing rumours that “the queen was dead.”

Later, Gloria and her then-husband Linwood Simon attended a party that she says was “full of debauchery.” This is where she had

a sudden encounter. “I specifically remember the Holy Spirit [the invisible person of God] grabbing my collar and saying, ‘That’s enough.’”

“I was shaken. I was raised to know that alcohol and drugs were not the way. God just said to me, ‘Get away from there. Move away from that.’ I left that party and never looked back.”

God had always been in the back of Gloria’s mind but now she couldn’t think of anything else. She went back to church and listened as the minister asked if anyone wanted to accept Christ as their Savior.

“Accept Christ? I didn’t even know what that meant,” she admits. “I rushed home from church, dusted off my Bible, opened it up and cried out to God, ‘If You really are there then answer this, who is this Jesus

and do I need to know Him?’”

She came across the verse Isaiah 7:14: “Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign: The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel, meaning God with us.”

“God with us,” Gloria murmured, finally realising who Jesus was. “Jesus is God with us. He is with us always, every day. He had been with me when I was a girl listening to my mom sing, when I was teenager, when I was a young woman performing in clubs night after night.

Jesus is God with us.”

From that day on, Gloria’s life changed completely. “I was born again that first day that I sat down with the Bible. I asked God to make it real to me. I had money and fame, but there was a great void, a God-shaped void, in my life. I was willing to let my old self die and I was ready to accept the gifts and strengths He would give me.”

Now, instead of just performing for her audiences, she engages with them and tells them the story of Jesus. That’s why she recorded a Christian version of her most popular song, “I used to tell them, ‘I Will Survive’, now I tell them how.”

Gloria is 77 now but still performs. A two-time Grammy winner and seven-time nominee, she won her first Grammy 40 years ago. In 2019, she released *Testimony*, a Christian gospel album which earned the singer her second Grammy.

And that is how this queen of disco became a humble and devout woman, giving up her the throne of her life to Jesus, the King of Kings. ●



Jesus loves me - so what?

MOST of us have heard the phrase “Jesus loves you”. It sounds ‘nice’, non-judgemental and kind, but what does it actually mean? If God loves everyone, no matter how you behave or what you believe then does it matter how we behave or what we believe?

“Jesus (or God) loves you” is a phrase that does not actually appear in the Bible and, although it is true and seemingly simple to understand, the word “love” has been so diluted and redefined by our culture that saying “Jesus loves you” is often either meaningless to people or misunderstood.

Too often one might think that when Christians say “Jesus loves you” they mean God looks on you with kindly affection like a big daddy in the sky, indulgently patting




you on the head and overlooking any bad behavior. Or that the phrase means that Jesus loves all your lifestyle choices and endorses all your ideas, clapping from the sidelines and cheering you on like a life-coach.

However, here is an analogy that more accurately portrays what that phrase “Jesus loves you” means.

Imagine a kitten stuck in a sewer pipe underground. It was born down there. It is cold and wet and dirty, and the only light it has seen comes through a pavement grate. It suspects there is more to life than its dark, smelly existence but it has no power to escape.

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Jesus loves me - so what?

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Love comes by and sees that kitten, meowing pathetically down there on the other side of the grate. Love is moved with compassion and has the power to rescue the creature, and so Love removes the grate and reaches down into the sewer pipe and offers to help, calling to the kitten in a gentle, kind voice.

Love does not grab the kitten by the scruff of the neck, it holds out its hand and invites the kitten to take that final step to safety.

That is how God loves us. He sees our situation, filthy with sin and trapped in our meaningless lives, and God cared enough to do something to rescue us and He is powerful enough to make a way for that to happen – through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. And then He extends an invitation and we have a choice.

If that kitten takes the final step and walks into Love's hand, then that kitten needs to know two things. One is that everything will change. That kitten will get washed, live somewhere else, do different things and leave behind the life and diet it has always known.

The second thing is that if that



kitten takes the hand that is offered, it will belong to its rescuer. Love will own it and, from then on, its life will not be its own. It will not be able to dictate its own path.

Sometimes Love will let it experience things that hurt and that it doesn't understand – like vet visits and shots. But the kitten can always know that everything Love allows is for its good.

What the kitten can't do is thank Love for the hand up and then go and live its life on its own terms. It will end up back in the sewer.

Accepting Jesus as our rescuer, our Savior, means that we agree to a wholesale makeover so that we are fit to live in His house, and we also agree to Him being our master – our Lord. If we want any part of our old life more than we want the new life He offers us then we need to understand His offer is all or nothing.

Becoming a Christian is not like adding some condiment to your life, like you do to improve or change the flavour of your food. That is a false gospel. Jesus is no add on, no rubber stamp for your lifestyle. Jesus loves you enough to pull you out of the mess that you are in and make all things new. This is exactly what the bible tells us in 2 Corinthians chapter 5 and verse 17 which says; "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away; behold all things have become new." His rescue offer cost Him everything on the cross, and in return He requires everything of us if we accept it.

Love reached down and made a way out of your sewer, do you trust Love enough to take His hand?

"Sin is believing the lie that you are self-created, self-dependent and self-sustained." - St. Augustine. Freedom from sin therefore comes from believing the truth that you are God-created, God-dependent, and God-sustained.

Whispering Danny heard the truth loud & clear

Benign tumours growing on Danny Kobzantsev's larynx require surgery every three months, leaving his voice so weak that it frequently drops off into a whisper - hence his nickname Whispering Danny. He's a popular tattoo artist in Kansas City, Missouri, who uses the opportunity with his captive audience to share more than ink.

Danny came to America from Latvia with his mother in 1975 to seek better options for treatment of his unusual medical condition.

Danny and his mother set up shop in Kansas City, MO. In high school, he was drawn to tattooing. The more ink he got on his arm, the more he realized he wanted to become a tattoo artist.

"I lived a lifestyle that was pretty self-destructive in many ways and I was okay with it," Danny says. "I pretty much had completely abandoned anything pertaining to God, and I just pursued my own interests."

Danny hails from Jewish survivors of the Nazi Holocaust, but when his good friend Shane crashed drunk on his motorcycle and very nearly died, he found himself praying to Jesus for a simple reason:

"It seemed like the thing to do," he says on an I Am Second video.

Drinking buddy Shane Kampe roared up to Exile Tattoo shop on his motorcycle on September 4, 2001. He was drunk and had no business riding that day, so when Shane tried to drive off, Danny attempted to dissuade him.

"I watched him try to get on his motorcycle and I immediately saw him drop the bike cos he was so drunk," he says. "I begged him, 'Please Shane don't do this.'"

A couple hours later, Danny inexplicably felt compelled to go for a drive. He had nowhere to go but he arrived exactly where God wanted him: at the accident scene of his friend.

"His head was busted wide open," Danny recalls. "He was lying in a pool of dark, dark blood."

Shane bent down next to his buddy, even getting his own face bloody, and whispered, "Shane, you're going to be ok."

It was a lie. From what he surmised from the injuries, there was no hope. Still he tried to encourage his friend "It seemed like the thing to say," Danny says.

Danny stayed in the waiting room while surgeons in ER tried to save Shane. It was hopeless, and Danny overheard someone talk about harvesting his organs for transplant. Shane's mother, meanwhile, pleaded with God for just one more day of life to be with her son.

"Finally, the doctors came out and they said he's still alive, but he won't be for long," Danny says.

Then a man who Danny didn't recognize came into the waiting room and called all the people to pray for Shane.

The man said, "Gather round; gather round. We're gonna have a prayer circle."

"Oh great God in heaven," the man continued, "We have a situation here at St. Luke's hospital. This young man Shane is so broken that no man on earth can fix him, and his brain has been busted, but, God, we know you can fix him. So won't you please fix him? And by the way we need him fixed before tomorrow morning."

"So I said 'amen' too," Danny remembers. "It seemed like the thing to do."

But then he thought, "Do I even believe in God? Am I just talking to himself? Why would God heal Shane?"

Wondering, he searched Google for the term 'salvation'.

The website asked him if he realized he was a sinner. He had no problem recognizing his sin. He had made no bones about it.

It was 4:00 a.m. There was a prayer of salvation at the end and Danny scanned it to make sure he wouldn't be scammed. It didn't appear to have any bad information, just interesting stuff about Jesus' death on the cross. So Danny prayed it. It seemed harmless. The website said he was forgiven, part of God's family now. That seemed decent. It wasn't so bad.

Danny prayed it a second time, this time more sincerely. He was meditating on God when he heard a hubbub coming from the doctors. "Doctors and nurses running around frantic. The doctors were

yelling at the nurses," he says. "Obviously they had the wrong CAT scan or the wrong MRI, they were saying."

Why? "My friend Shane woke up. It was impossible for this guy to have woken up, but there he was wide awake."

Danny couldn't deny what had happened, even though he initially had a feeling like he was betraying his Jewish heritage. The feelings of guilt were worsened by the fact that his grandparents were Holocaust survivors.

But Jesus was Jewish too. And the Jewish Messiah Jesus had performed an undeniable miracle.

"The guilt that I felt about betraying my family or my ancestry I've actually completely lost," he says. "A void is filled. There is nothing else like it. It's not just religious stuff. You now have a genuine interaction. You get answered, you get guidance. I cannot deny something that has revealed itself to be true to me."



Detox from darkness

Living with bikers from the age of 15. Raped at 16. Held at gunpoint at 21. How Sarah Smith lived to see her 22nd birthday is a mystery to her.

"I was selling drugs for the bikers and I stupidly allowed a customer to take some on credit," Sarah tells Challenge News, rolling her eyes.

Of course they never paid - and that's how Sarah, drug-addicted and homeless, ended up owing the Hell's Angels \$2000. To teach her a lesson, two gang members drove her to a deserted area and held a gun to each side of her head as they told her she had better pay them back or else.

"I didn't know what to do," Sarah says. "I had left my own toxic home years ago and I felt the gang was like a family."


But The Waltons the Hell's Angels are not. They injected the young girl with her first dose of amphetamines soon after she joined them. "I loved it," Sarah admits. "I was instantly addicted."

With the drugs came unhealthy relationships, addiction, sexual encounters and witchcraft. "Bikers pride themselves on being anti-Christ and satanic," Sarah reveals. "They would cast spells and do tarot card readings. It was dark, very dark."

At 16, she was raped - in front of a group of people - by a woman. Sarah, who lived in Cairns, Australia, fled to Darwin after that.

Unfortunately in Darwin she fell into the gang and drugs lifestyle again, culminating in that night in the bush when she was sure she was going to be shot in the head.

"I called an ex-partner and he was so kind he paid my debt off and put me on the bus to Perth to live with some of his relatives."

But Sarah ended up back on drugs and two years later, at 23, she was booted out.

"I really did want to kick the drugs but I had no idea how," she says quietly. "The addiction was still there because I never dealt with the underlying issues of my childhood - the rage, the hatred, the rejection, the self-loathing, the bitterness."

"The drugs just covered all of that. I HATED myself. I felt I was to blame for my parents' divorce and yet I resented them because of the abuse and neglect. I was a mess and very lost."

She started selling drugs again. "And then one day a buyer asked me: 'is this all you've been born

for?'" The question was like a thunderbolt between the eyes. That night she repeated it to nobody in particular. "I kind of asked the universe," she remembers. "I mean, I didn't know anyone else would be listening."

"But suddenly I felt this overwhelming love flood my soul. I'd never felt anything like it before. And I kind of heard: 'No this is not what you were created for'. I was dumbstruck! I thought I'd made a connection with the universe!"

While this experience didn't get Sarah off drugs, it did prod her into going to the Salvation Army, where she met Anne Stokes, a counsellor who was her first encounter with a truly caring person.

She joined the Salvation Army's detox program - "and that's when I realized this was a spiritual battle going on for my life," she says.

"During detox my body became

paralysed but my mind worked and it was VERY scary...things on the wall would manifest demonically towards me. It felt like a tug of war, darkness and light trying to pull me to their side."

It took two tries but Sarah finally made it through the program. In a last-ditch attempt to get her life together, she went to Sydney. At Darling Harbour, she picked up a flyer advertising a free barbecue at a carpark.

"After we finished eating, we went into a huge auditorium - I didn't know it then, but I had landed at [a big well-known Sydney church!]" Sarah says, marvelling at how everything fell into place.

"All I remember was someone asking people to come to the front if they wanted Jesus in their lives. I don't even remember walking ... it was like I floated to the front." That was June 5, 2005. Sarah was 25.

Back in Perth, she enrolled in a Bible college. After stumbling back into drugs again, her college leader recommended she go to Teen Challenge, a Christian residential rehabilitation facility in Western Australia.

It was there that the pieces of Sarah's broken life were finally put back together. "They ministered to me with the love of God there. I finally dealt with everything. It was like 20 years of Christian ministry squashed into a year. It was intense, one of the hardest things I've ever done but finally, thanks to God, I was healed."

In the eight years since then, Sarah has gotten married and had two daughters. She works as a disability support worker and runs a street program at her church.

"I truly am, as the Bible says, a new creation, completely healed from the inside out," she beams.


"I'm living the life of abundance Jesus promised in John 10:10. At Teen Challenge I heard God say to me 'I'm here to protect you, correct you and direct you.' That has been my plumb line ever since."

Abuser beaten by love

Buth Nhorn of Cambodia killed many, many people, he confesses.

"I laid countless land mines. I built and ran an orphanage for the purpose of raising child soldiers. As a Buddhist, I calculated that I was beyond redemption. What could I possibly do to compensate for what I had done?"

"On 18 March 1970, young Vietnamese guerrillas with black teeth marched me into the forest to join the Khmer Rouge. Because I was opposed to Lon Nol and loyal to Prince Norodom Sihanouk, I stayed. In fact, I became a commander and even continued fighting underground after the overthrow of Pol Pot in 1979. I survived numerous injuries. As you can see, my body bears the scars of battle."

In 1978 he married Reth. "The following year we escaped to Thailand.

In 1987 my wife became ill and

for a whole year could not straighten her fingers. A neighbor took her to a church.

"They began praying for my wife and after six months she was healed. Reth became a Christian and even hosted a Bible study in our home."

In 1991 they returned to Cambodia.

"I rejected this foreign religion, Christianity and was cruel to my wife. Yet, the more I abused her, the more she loved me. She returned good for evil. This seemed too good to be true. But, why would she lie to me? I watched my wife carefully. For eight years she prayed for me.

"One day I beat my wife until she was unconscious. But still she loved me. I was a drunkard and a killer. My life was a disaster.

"Secretly, I began to read the Bible. I was confident that I would finally expose my wife's delusion. When I read John chapter three, verse 16, I was overwhelmed by God's love. I knew I was sinful. I wanted a new life. I too believed."

John 3:16 says: "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life."

For several months But Nhorn questioned every pastor he met. "I needed to know, was I forgiven or not? If we believe, God will forgive us. This is what the Bible says. I believe in God's promise," he nods.

In Isaiah 1:18-19 for instance, God offers: "Come now, and let us reason together," says the Lord,

"Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red like crimson, they shall be as wool. If you are willing and obedient, you shall eat the good of the land."

No matter what we have done in our past or how many terrible things we have said and done, God will forgive us freely and completely if we simply submit ourselves to Him and ask.

In 1999 But Nhorn became a pastor, telling others all about the wonderful freedom he has found in Jesus.

Vision ends battle with drugs

When Steve Fenchel was seven years old, his father became ill, and was in and out of the hospital for two years. Then suddenly, he was gone.


"I was devastated by his death," Steve told Chosen People Ministries. "I think of it as being like a stabbing wound, right at my heart," he recounted.

The unexpected death led to a significant personality change in Steve. "I became like the neighborhood bully. I can remember when someone was pushing my brother, I went into a rage. I really beat this kid up."

"I wanted to be a tough guy. To me, Jewish kids were more like accountants than tough guys. I wanted to run as far away from my Jewish identity as I could."

In eighth grade, Steve started drinking and fell into the wrong crowd. He smoked dope, got into street fights, and stole money from his mother. "By the time I got into high school, I was drinking, using drugs, very angry, and I had a nervous breakdown.

The use of amphetamines and LSD led to hallucinations. "My mind started going cuckoo. I just lost it completely."



Steve locked himself in his room and stayed there, essentially, for two years. He experienced a visitation from his deceased father, who appeared to be glowing, dressed in white. "Come with me; I'm going to take you to see my God," his father imparted.

But Steve did not feel worthy. In fact, he felt filthy. "I can't go to see God. I can't go with you," he said.

"I could feel myself pushing the vision away, pushing God away, saying 'go away, I'm not ready. I can't go with you,'" he recalled.

Then suddenly, Steve received a startling vision of hell. "I was freezing cold. I was catapulting downward into this abyss. I had a feeling I was surrounded by demons, godless things. I was falling endlessly, and I was being swept into a place I didn't even know existed, which felt to me like hell."

One night Steve ventured out of the house on a rainy night and was accosted by a hooded woman in the street. "Did you know Jesus loves you?" she asked.

What do I want to have anything to do with her and her religion and her Jesus? Steve thought. But "I felt and experienced in her eyes the love of Jesus. This is what I'm looking for. This is real," he thought.

The woman handed him a tract with quotes from C.S. Lewis.

"I didn't even know C.S. Lewis was a Christian. I thought C.S. Lewis was a hippie like me living in Berkeley. I fell in love with Aslan and Narnia [Lewis' children's novel]."

Then he got a surprising phone call from the couple who has first introduced him to drugs. "Steve, we found God. He can accept you. He died for you!" They then shared the Good News about Jesus with Steve.

"I knew what they were telling me was the truth," he recounted. "I just sensed it. It was where my whole search was leading. I hung up the phone. I wanted to pray."

"Lord, I believe you are who these people are telling me. I believe you are my Lord and I ask you to come into my life, forgive my sins, take over my life, and bring me into your kingdom. Amen."

Steve was born again and felt an immediate, overwhelming sense of peace. "I always felt in life I was carrying around a burden. I was drawn to the blues, sad things, dark poetry, I felt lighter and freer after I asked Jesus to come into my life."

"The drugs I did were really a way for me to escape that burden of depression which I carried. I physically felt different.

"I consider myself today to be a Jew who has found his Messiah. He was sent for us. My search for my father ended when I found Him."

Steve went to be with his Messiah on June 10, 2018.

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The two sides of abuse

Victim of abuse finds healing and becomes a lifesaver

Kristin Moon, 34, was as desperate as she had ever been. Curled up in a ball in her back room so her five-year-old son Adam couldn't hear or see her, she let the tears flow.

Her marriage was in tatters. "I was in a dysfunctional relationship with what I now know was a narcissist," the disability support worker, now 48, says. "He was very controlling and we fought all the time."

"My ex-husband was also involved in pornography; I felt there were like, 25 people in the bed with us. It affected me to the point where I struggled with sexual immorality too."

"I was a wreck; I was broken. I'd left several times before but I always came back. Finally I reached a point where I said to myself 'if I stay married to this man, I will go insane.'"

Then a girlfriend invited her to a church in Perth. Kristin remembers her first service there as being "different".

"My ex-husband was a Catholic and I'd been to church with him before, but this new church was different," she recalls.

"The pastor spoke of us having a real relationship with a risen Jesus Christ, which I'd never heard of before in my husband's church. I always thought God was like a distant star, that if I was really lucky, I might get something good from Him. But now I KNOW He is really a good kind and faithful Father."

"This was exactly what I was craving - true love and a healthy relationship. I was already at the end of my rope." At the end of the service, when the pastor asked if anyone in the congregation wanted to commit their lives to Jesus, Kristin didn't hesitate. Her hand shot up.

Kristin, who ultimately got divorced in 2014, grew slowly but steadily in her new relationship with God. "It took me a while to understand that I could trust the Lord to fight my battles," she confesses. "There were gaps in the foundations of my faith. Put simply, there were some bits missing!"

In 2009, Kristin was a canteen



manager. Looking for a career change, she prayed in earnest for God to help her. Almost immediately, she says she felt God say to her: "You are going to be a lifesaver."

Kristin was stunned. "I knew He wasn't talking about being a lifesaver at a pool; I knew He meant I would be helping to save lives for Christ. That was a watershed moment for me."

That prompting she got has been a guiding star for her faith walk since then. Kristin had a bout with depression and was hospitalised for bi-polar disorder in 2013, but says she has grown much more in her faith.

"I never understood that I didn't have to carry all my pain," she says. "But slowly with the right teaching and loving counsel from a good friend, I now understand that Jesus has taken it all for me on the cross."

She has joined a church and is a member of its street evangelism team. "My life now is all about winning souls for God," says the friendly

brunette. "I really am trying to live up to that calling of being a lifesaver."

"My journey in God has been up and down - information from sermons and Bible studies that have to make their way from your head to your heart, piece by piece, like putting a building together."

Her favorite Bible passage is Psalm 103: 1-5: "Bless the Lord, O my soul; And all that is within me, bless His holy name! Bless the Lord, O my soul, And forget not all His benefits: Who forgives all your iniquities, Who heals all your diseases, Who redeems your life from destruction, Who crowns you with lovingkindness and tender mercies, Who satisfies your mouth with good things, So that your youth is renewed like the eagle's."

Kristin concludes: "I was an obnoxious, rebellious and selfish person, yet God has forgiven me and crowned me with joy. I used to feel so hopeless, but he has brought back my life from the pit."

Perpetrator of abuse gets to the bottom of his behavior and learns to let go of violence

In 2005, Michael Clark* had been married to his second wife for a couple of years and was navigating the stress and changes that come with marriage and blending two families. He admits he did not respond well to these challenges.

"I was responding violently to things that were happening in our relationship," Michael admits in an interview with The Christian Post. "There were times when my wife would say something really hurtful, I would respond by slapping her, one time I pushed her into a closet and pulled her hair."

At other times he would pound his fist on the table, slam doors and shout at the top of his lungs.

"These things aren't technically considered domestic violence but they're still damaging to a relationship and intimidating to a partner and therefore, not good for a relationship," he explains.

Although violence didn't make him feel any better, he said he responded in this way due to "not having good emotional control in tense situations."

Michael was arrested for domestic violence and jailed twice that year before being mandated to attend an intervention program and given probation. A restraining order prevented him from contacting his wife and step-children.

While he loved his wife and didn't want to hurt her, Michael didn't know how to change.

He knew his actions were affecting the people he loved, his job and his reputation but everything he'd tried in the past hadn't made a difference.

In the intervention program, he was told the reason men hit their partners was due to a 'macho' attitude of entitlement. The solution was to recognize that violence towards women was wrong and to drop their

male-superiority beliefs.

But Michael already knew hitting was wrong and he did not think he was superior to women. Many other men in the class agreed. Michael felt discouraged and frustrated.

Michael began researching the subject by poring over academic textbooks. He also spent time with a counsellor - something that helped him understand his research as well as how past experiences affected him. It also helped him identify underlying emotions and beliefs that caused him to become violent. One of the beliefs he uncovered was that he was not lovable.

Michael reluctantly started going to church as it was the only opportunity to see his wife.

He had attended church occasionally in the past but as he listened to the messages, they were different to what he remembered hearing in church before.

He heard about God's love for him as well as accounts from people whose lives had been transformed.

About a year later, Michael cried out to God. He confessed that he'd made a mess of his life and asked God to help him change.

He said his relationship with Jesus, combined with good counselling, has transformed him.

"Going to church and hearing this message that God loves me, accepting that and believing that changes me," he attests. "I'm far less concerned about what people think, including my partner. I don't have to worry about rejection and abandonment because I know God has always

been with me. Understanding how God sees me and accepting my identity as His beloved child really was a game changer in how I thought and also how I could think about those situations."

When he comprehended God's love for him, Michael no longer felt unlovable.

He has written a book called From Villain to Hero: Encouragement and a map to stop domestic violence or abuse that hurts the ones you love in an aim to help people that are causing harm, to heal and move forward.

"I really started the book while I was in the process of making changes in my life," he tells The Christian Post.

"As I progressed and learned things and felt those changes in my life, the book continued to take form."

Michael also started the Ananias Foundation (ananiasfoundation.org) which provides online guidance and encouragement for individuals who want to stop hurting the ones they love.

Apart from Michael's book, the resources offered by the Ananias Foundation are available free of charge.

Michael is now violence-free and has a loving, respectful marriage with his new wife, Lynn.

Drawn to the occult

After a childhood of bullying and then suffering the loss of his sister, Angelo Nero's search for power led him to make a pact with the devil and he became a Satanist.

But then he caught sight of his reflection in a shop window.

"I looked at my black boots, my black coat and my claw rings," he recalls. "But it was something completely different that worried me. My facial expression. There was nothing that was reflected in this face, no joy, not even anger or hatred... I searched my heart and came across the irrefutable answer. It was all the witch books and the unholy pact that finally corrupted and changed me. It was the stories I had read and the films I had watched that had creepily prepared me for my downfall from childhood."

As a young child growing up in Switzerland, Angelo had a belief in God, and was even bullied for his faith in school. He was ashamed to tell his parents about the bullying but it finally came to light when he was nearly strangled by a classmate after swimming lessons.

So as a teenager Angelo was attracted by the promise of power that he felt as he walked past a New Age shop and saw tarot cards being advertised in the shop window.

"Although I had never held such cards in my hands before, I knew exactly what they were used for," Angelo says. "Even as a child, I saw enough movies and read enough books to know the power inherent in occult practices."

He heard an inner voice warning him not to enter the shop but he felt an attraction to do something he shouldn't do. Fascinated, he entered and after looking at the tarot cards, the sales assistant gave him a deck. Although he wasn't sure if it was okay to use tarot cards as a Christian he took the deck and decided

to try them out.


When Angelo was 14, his older sister was diagnosed with lung cancer. He and his family prayed to God for a miracle, but she sadly passed away. He remembers grief, anger and despair raged within him and he started questioning God's goodness.. He wrapped his childhood Bible in a black cloth so he no longer had to see it and took it along with his tarot cards and some other New Age items to a castle ruin. In a ritual on the castle grounds, Angelo renounced Jesus and made a pact in blood with the devil and demanded his power.

"I made no secret to my family and closest friends that I was no longer a Christian, but I was careful not to reveal myself as a Satanist," Angelo remembers. Continuing to use tarot cards and even casting spells to overthrow churches, Angelo became a witch-master.

But then Angelo caught sight of his reflection and realized he had not gained power but emptiness.

He realized it was his greed for power because he no longer wanted to be a victim that had led him to paths he should not have taken. He tried to renounce his pact with the devil but he believed he would never be able to break the chains that bound him to the occult.

"I got to the bottom of my life when I loathed myself and couldn't look myself in

the eye," Angelo remembers. "My hatred turned more and more against myself and I was about to jump off a bridge to end my life. That's when I remembered that God is still there. I shouted into the night sky: 'God, if you're here and want to help me and forgive my sins, then do something.'"

He didn't have to wait long. The next day he received a phone call from an old Christian friend from high school. Although they hadn't spoken in years, the friend invited Angelo to go away for a long weekend with his church.

"I thought: do I really want to spend a whole weekend with fanatical Christians?" Angelo says. "Actually not. But I kept thinking: I don't believe in coincidences. Which means that this call took place for a reason."

He agreed and found the group to be welcoming and non-judgemental. The following week, Angelo attended a church service with his friend and felt it was time to decide whether he wanted to continue to be lost in the dark or start a new life. He chose to give his life to Jesus. His friend and another man prayed for Angelo but when they asked him to pray, he couldn't.

"It was enormously difficult for me to even speak the name of the Son of God over my lips or to address any words to Him at all... It made me sick, but I tried hard and then the words suddenly flowed, 'Jesus Christ forgive me that I have turned away from

You. Forgive me that I have entered into the powers of Satan and have consciously acted against Your will. Break the demonic chains that hold me captive. I know that You have paid for all my transgressions on the cross with Your blood. I thank You that through Your sacrifice I am freed from everything, that You redeemed me from the claws of the devil and paid the toll with your life. I want to give You my life, Jesus Christ. Amen."

He says he felt free and alive again.

"Much has changed since I became a Christian," Angelo explains. "I know that Jesus Christ made me completely free that evening in

church, but that doesn't mean everything was fine then. I still had a hard time struggling to forgive. But God has worked on me and shaped me over the years and He still does it today. God is working on me every day and sometimes it's easier and sometimes it's harder."

Angelo has written Christian fantasy books and two autobiographies and visits events in the "dark scene" (goths, occultists, Satanists etc) to show them there is a way out.

Death scare shocks witch

Bullied at school and experiencing turmoil in her home life, Cheyenne turned to the supernatural but found herself caught up in a world of fear.

Sharing her story on her YouTube channel, Cheyenne said she didn't have any friends and struggled with feelings of loneliness, depression and anxiety. She self-harmed and began experimenting with the paranormal. She started using Ouija boards regularly and became fascinated with vampires.

"In high school I really got worse," she remembers. "My depression got worse, my anxiety got worse. I became extremely suicidal. I didn't want to live anymore. I saw no point in living because I didn't really have anybody. I didn't feel a connection to anybody."

In college Cheyenne started dabbling in the New Age and witchcraft practices.

"I would do meditation and manifestation," she recalls. "I always wanted to do astral projection, I wanted to talk to my spirit guides and angels and I played with tarot cards and Ouija boards."

Cheyenne said she cast spells and set up an altar with crystals and books about witchcraft.

"I felt so powerful and so strong and like I was better than everybody," she remembers.

But there was something about witchcraft that didn't feel right with her. She said it was like a puzzle piece that didn't fit.

Her ex-boyfriend's mother was a Christian and began to tell her about Jesus' love for her. Prior to this Cheyenne said she felt disgusted by Christianity.

"It made me uncomfortable and angry," she admits. "Any time anybody talked about Jesus or God or anything to do with that like it just made me angry."

But her ex-boyfriend's mom encouraged her to ask Jesus to reveal Himself to her.

"I prayed to God and [I said], 'I don't know if You're real but I'd really like to know You. I really want to know You because something just doesn't feel right in my life. So please just reveal Yourself to me.' Around that time my eyes really started to open up to the world around me. It's like the world just became so beautiful and colorful."

Then Cheyenne had to have dental surgery and had a strong sense that something wasn't right. She had had dental surgery before and felt fine but this time a sense of fear overcame her.

"I was absolutely terrified, like petrified, for some odd reason," she recalled. "I was just

so scared, like I just felt in my gut like something was going to happen ... So I prayed to God and Jesus and I was like, 'Hey I know I've talked to You last week but I'm extremely terrified and I just feel this need to ask You for help and I pray that You watch over me through this because for some reason I'm absolutely scared and I don't know what's wrong.'"

After the surgery was finished and Cheyenne woke up, her mother told her there had been some complications and it took extra half an hour to wake her up. Cheyenne said she thought if she hadn't prayed before the surgery, she could have gone into a coma or even died.

"I was kind of in shock after that," she says. "It took me a little while to put two and two together but I prayed and then that happened. After that I told my mom that I think I believe in God and I want to get a Bible."



Cheyenne was angry at everything but has now found joy.

Her mom bought her a Bible and she read it over that Christmas, reading with interest about Jesus' birth as she celebrated it. That month she gave her life to Jesus and invited Him to be her Lord. She realized the power of prayer even further when she started feeling afraid at night.

"I couldn't sleep because I felt like somebody was watching me and I was just terrified to be alone in the dark in my room," she remembered. She tried watching TV shows from her childhood but she still felt afraid and was only getting a few hours of sleep each night.


"Then I started praying every night before bed and I started listening to an audio Bible when I fell asleep instead of watching kids shows and all [the fear] started to disappear," she says. "All of the fear melted away."

Now Cheyenne says she is trying to become like Jesus more and more every single day.

"It was a long journey but I feel like I'm finally home and it is the biggest relief."

She encourages other people who are angry with Jesus or questioning Him to ask Him to reveal Himself to them.

"Ask Him for assistance or for Him to reveal Himself to you and be open to Him and He will come to you. He wants to know you, He wants to love you fully but you have to let Him in and He will change your life for the better," she attests.

ONE day in my life stands out with great clarity. Not the good epiphany kind of clarity; more the my-life-flashed-before-me variety. It was the day my husband and I took part in a sailing competition.

In less experienced hands, this would have been a problem. In our less than less experienced hands, it was a disaster. We tossed, we turned, we capsized.

My husband climbed back in with all the dexterity of an Army man used to obstacle courses. I, being of the species *Sailor Ineptus*, couldn't. The officials in the rescue boat hurtling towards us were laughing so hard I wished they would capsize too.

It was seriously difficult to get back into the boat. It seemed like all the forces of nature were conspiring against me. The lashing rain made it hard to see, the boat was bucking like a bronco on steroids, the current and the waves tossed me about, and the life jacket kept pushing up around my head as though seeking to decapitate me.



Christ our Pilot by Warner Sallman






Sneaker waves

ANDREW Machi and his family were vacationing in Northern California, celebrating his thirty-ninth birthday when he lost his life to a "sneaker wave".

The family had gone to Luffenholz Beach where Andrew was fishing off the rocks when a wave came in, sweeping him off the rocks and pulling him out to sea. His wife jumped in to try to help him, but the surf kept pushing her back into the rocks.

Even though help arrived by helicopter within ten minutes of being called, it was too late for Andrew. A coroner told his family that he believed Andrew had hit his head on the rocks and was knocked out.

The very next day, about 400 miles up the coast on Manzanita Beach, a woman was seriously injured when the log she was sitting on was hit and lifted by a "sneaker wave." Rescue personnel described her as being "crushed."

Sneaker waves are deadly, dangerous waves that catch the unwary person off-guard. The surf could be calm with the waves coming up only so far for a good ten to twenty minutes, and then suddenly, without warning, a wave much larger and stronger than the rest will come crashing in, coming up the beach far higher than the rest. This is where people get caught.

The sneaker wave comes in with a pile of sand, gravel and water that fills a person's clothes and then drags them back out to sea. Then there is the added danger of freezing water temperatures and strong currents, which can kill a person in moments.

This happens to quite a few people, more than you might think!

In Australia, rock fishing has been identified as the third highest cause of coastal drowning, following swimming or wading, and boating.

In the USA, the National Weather Service states that, "For much of the West Coast, sneaker waves kill more people than all other weather hazards combined."

They go on to say, "Survivors all say the same thing: They thought they were far enough from the surf to be safe. They never saw the wave coming." They go on to warn, "Never turn your back on the ocean."

Countless millions of people are just like those who sit on the beach, not paying attention, an easy prey to the "sneaker wave" of death. They go through life busy with work, pleasure and the pursuit of happiness, never giving a thought that one day the God whom they must face will say, "You fool! This night your soul will be required of you" (Luke 12:20).

Why does God use such strong language? Because only a fool would not use the time they had before death to seek and to know God.

Anyone who really wants to can find peace with God. It requires coming to Him His way, and not the way we think is best.

God has given us creation so that we can know there IS a God. He has given us the Bible so that we can know HOW to come to Him for forgiveness of our sins and our eternal salvation. He promises that if we truly, earnestly seek Him, we will find Him. "You will seek Me, and find Me, when you search for Me with all your heart" (Jeremiah 29:13).

Time is short. Our lives pass in the blink of an eye, so to speak. Death will claim each one of us; we just don't know when. If you



Believe It or Not

Dating not written in stone

AUSTRALIAN geologist Dr Andrew Snelling is on a campaign to expose the false dating in evolutionary circles. He has demonstrated the complete unreliability of modern rock dating methods.

Snelling has discovered rocks that can be dated as both millions of years old and a few hundred days old, depending on which of two methods you use! Yet it's the same rock, formed at the same time, in the same place, and both radioactive dating methods are frequently used in today's geology. This huge inconsistency casts doubt on the whole process.

The evidence Snelling presents could on its own blow apart the theory of evolution, because it shows that the billions of years of Earth history - essential for evolution - may be an illusion.

A typical example of false dating that Snelling highlights is the lava from Mt St Helens, the volcano that erupted in 1980 in south-west Washington.

Samples of these rocks were sent for dating - when they were only 10 years old - to a top laboratory used by geologists in America. When the results came back, they gave dates of millions of years!

Much of Dr Snellings research has focused on the famous Grand Canyon. He sent samples of the Canyon's oldest and youngest rocks to be dated in the best labs, and the dates came back as almost identical! Where did all the millions of years of gradual rock formation in-between go?

He concludes that they simply never existed.

He also reveals that radioactive carbon has been found in almost the entire fossil-bearing geological column. Why is this significant? Because radioactive carbon decays out of existence in less than 250,000 years, so it shouldn't exist in rocks that are hundreds of millions of years old - unless rocks really aren't that old.

Geologist's journey out of old-earth ideas

Most people who have been through high school geography believe that rock formations and geological layers are proof of the evolutionary timeline; however Dr John Matthews (B.Sc. Mathematics (1961), Ph.D. earth science (2004)) would beg to differ.

Before retirement, John worked for 16 years in the nuclear power industry, followed by 30 years in the upstream oil industry on geoscientific issues, where he gained European chartered geologist status (EurGeol, C.Geol, F.G.S.).

After earning his B.Sc. in mathematics, John became an engineer for the nuclear power industry. He specialized in heat transfer, fluid flow (water, steam, and liquid sodium), and reactor/nuclear physics.

Some years later, the nuclear power program started to wind down. Oil had been found in the North Sea, and the UK was short of geo-engineers who could take advantage of it. John was asked to retrain as a geoscientist. He and a group of trainees were chosen to spearhead a new geotechnical venture because of their familiarity with high-pressure fluid flow.

During John's training, he was introduced to uniformitarian geology (the assumption that the geological formations we see today were created by slow steady changes over long periods of time instead of catastrophic events), which he "absorbed hook, line, and sinker." Although he had been a Christian since he was a teenager, and dedicated his life to Christ through a high school Bible class, John did not believe the biblical creation account described real history.

Journey to biblical creation

Then John came across DCC Watson's 1975 book *The Great Brain Robbery: Creation or evolution?*¹. He almost didn't read it—because Watson unapologetically taught that biblical creation as found in Genesis 1–11 was historical.

Watson's book mentioned the creationist classic *The Genesis Flood* by John Whitcomb and Henry Morris (1961). John bought a copy. He admits it took him nine months to read.

"It wasn't that I was a slow reader—but it was challeng-

ing everything I'd ever considered about Genesis and geology," he explains.

This challenge particularly concerned two key concepts, on which he now concludes:

"Massive fossilization is only possible during catastrophic conditions. Uniformitarianism cannot explain fossilization. So the fossils are not a record of evolution—but judgment and death.

"The standard geological column creaks with inconsistencies. Having been alerted to this point, I could see confirmatory evidence within the geological maps I was often


using. Layers of sediments were labelled with names from the geological column—or described as undifferentiated—often with no evidence to support these names, except occasional continuity in seismic sections."

John testifies that in the process of reading and thinking about this book, he became a convinced six-day creationist. He was confronted with, and accepted, Genesis as real history—not meta-history or myth.

Oil is where you find it

Anti-creationists claim at times that when secular geologists find oil it somehow vindicates their uniformitarian approach. However, as John points out, their intermittent (1 in 10) successes in finding oil are not determined by the 'millions of years' idea.

He says, "A lot of oil is found by spotting leaks, then seismic surveys are done to look for the special-shaped underground structures that might be the source of that leaking oil. Then you spend millions of dollars drilling wells into those structures, and only then do you know if you have found the actual oil reservoirs. Also, oil is sometimes found in places where standard theories predict it shouldn't be."

industry. There, geologists would smile politely at his beliefs and occasionally offer a rebuttal.

However, in academia, John was confronted with: "You're out—no questions asked!"³

Moving onwards and upwards

Since this unpleasant experience, John has been busy. He has published a book⁴, and written for several creationist organizations. The COVID pandemic forced a pause in his creationist geology field trips along the Jurassic Coast. He plans to resume, as well as video, this activity as soon as possible.

John's aim is to proclaim the authority of the Bible as God's Word, and Genesis as historical fact. He encourages people to recognize that Scripture is the basis for the best explanation for geology, rocks and fossils.

The 6-DAY CANYON

People who visit Grand Canyon are usually informed that the canyon took millions of years to form, thanks to the slow erosion of the Colorado River, which is about 1½ kilometres down at the bottom.

Without looking at the Canyon, or thinking much, most people accept this evolutionary and deceptive view.

A canyon that did not take millions of years can be seen below Mount Saint Helens. This canyon formed in just a few hours.

Yet another canyon can be seen in Washington. It is called the Burlingame Canyon, and people watched it form. It is 460 metres long, and 36 metres deep.

What started off as a drainage ditch, ended up as a miniature Grand Canyon, complete with its own tiny river, and layering patterns up the sides.

These and other examples show that the idea of canyons being millions of years old, is not based on evidence, but on an assumption.

When you're in a spot of bother

Do you remember the story of Winnie-the-Pooh visiting his good friend Rabbit one day and following a wonderful afternoon tea, (where Pooh clearly ate too much) he became firmly wedged in the hole that served as Rabbit's front door? What followed was a highly amusing – and insightful – conversation between the two of them:

"Rabbit wanted to go for a walk too, and finding the front door full, he went out by the back door, and came round to Pooh, and looked at him. 'Hallo, are you stuck?' he asked. 'N-no,' said Pooh carelessly. 'Just resting and thinking and humming to myself.' 'The fact is,' said Rabbit, 'you're stuck.' 'It all comes,' said Pooh crossly, 'of not having front doors big enough.' 'It all comes,' said Rabbit sternly, 'of eating too much. I thought at the time,' said Rabbit, 'only I didn't like

to say anything,' said Rabbit, 'that one of us is eating too much,' said Rabbit, 'and I knew it wasn't me,' he said."

It's pretty clear these two need a crucial conversation but as we noted last month, barriers pop up which often prevent us from engaging in them!

What are some of the barriers to crucial conversations?

Inappropriately expressed anger

Anger can be both aggressive and passive. Aggressive anger is obvious to us. A person may yell, become abusive, be threatening and in some cases, use physical force to express their anger.

Passive anger, on the other hand, can lead a person to become sarcastic, shut down emotionally, sulk or make obscure comments which are intended to make a point but are not expressed honestly.

When a person consistently responds in one of the above ways every time a crucial conversation is broached, it acts as an immediate barrier by shutting the conversation down completely. In effect, the angry person is saying, "How dare you raise this with me? I do not want to listen to what you have to say!"

Defensiveness

By defensiveness, I am not talking about a person's need to explain why

they acted or spoke in a certain way. If you are going to get to the bottom of an issue, then both sides of the story must be told and heard. But you know someone is being defensive when they avoid answering the question and then launch into blaming you or someone else for the problem.

Denial

Denial is the close cousin of defensiveness, and a person is in denial when they either refuse to, or cannot see what is obvious to everyone else. Think of it this way: your friend is complaining constantly about the awful pain in their right foot, and you gently try to point out there is a piece of glass sticking out of it, only to be met with, "Stop trying to fix my

problem; I just want you to listen to me!"

Denial acts as a "safe" barrier for many people to avoid facing reality in their lives and hinders crucial conversations.

Hint dropping

This is wonderfully demonstrated in the story about Pooh and Rabbit above! Notice how Rabbit avoids the honest conversation with Pooh. He tells him what he "thought," naming the problem but not the person responsible, yet at the same time making it perfectly clear he is not the guilty party!

He forfeits the crucial conversation by never honestly talking with Pooh about his over-eating – he just hopes his friend will "get the hint!"


Hint dropping hurts: people catch

on you are making a point about them without being told exactly where they have failed you.

And it becomes a barrier because it actively works against open, loving, honest and clear conversation.

Understanding the barriers to crucial conversations is important, but they should not be seen as a permanent deterrent.

It just means we will need a bit more wisdom when we come up against them!



Clarifying questions combat confusion

I had to pick up my grandchildren after school recently and being a reliable grandfather, I made sure I was there in plenty of time before the bell rang.

When I arrived, my grandson was outside his classroom door with one of his friends and busily packing his bag in preparation for leaving.

My grandson's friend looked at me and turned to him and asked, "Is that your Grandad?"

"Yes!" answered my grandson.

And as naturally as you please, his friend said, "He doesn't look funny at all!"

Two thoughts immediately went through my mind.

First, I was pleased I didn't look funny!

Two, my grandson and I need to have a talk!

Throughout this year we have specifically focused on some practical skills to help us grow and develop our relationships with each other and whether it has been trying to break the habit of making assumptions in our conversations with others, being

lovingly honest instead of dropping hints or finding the courage to have a difficult conversation with someone, one thing is certain: each skill requires clear communication.

The story I told about my grandson above – which I find hilarious – is an excellent example of how communication can become both confused and problematic.

Based purely on what I heard that afternoon, my mind could have run off in all sorts of directions.


"What has my grandson been saying about me?"

"Okay – I don't look funny – but compared to who or what?!"

"Does my grandson really think I look that bad?"

My mind did not go in those directions, but this isn't always the case in our conversations, simply because we do not fully appreciate all that is involved in the communication process.

Experts in the field of communication studies have identified six factors which are involved when we are communicating with one another:



- What you actually say.
- What the other person hears.
- What the other person thinks he/she hears.
- What the other person says about what you said.
- What you think the other person said about what you said.

This can be quite daunting, but if you think about it carefully, these factors are always involved in the conversation process.

Karen could say to me, "I really love it when you put your arms around me and give me a hug!"

I hear her say those actual words but depending on how I am feeling at the time or any past insecurities I may be carrying, I might come out with something like, "But I have been doing that!"

As a result, she may well interpret my words as being defensive and respond by saying, "You don't have to be like that!". Suddenly the conversation is now far removed from its original intent.

But when we understand what is involved in communication, much confusion and misunderstanding can be avoided, and the above conversation could look something like this:

K: "I really love it when you put your arms around me and give me a hug!"

R: "Oh, why are you saying that?"
K: "Because when you do it makes me feel loved. You did it yesterday and it was really special to me."

R: "Thanks for telling me. I'm glad it meant a lot to you because I wanted you to know how much I love you."

K: "It was very special, and I wanted you to know."

What a completely different conversation and result!

Asking good questions, clarifying what each other is saying and giving more information, defuses much hurt, confusion, and frustration.

Better communication results when we have a good grasp of the basics: asking clarifying questions and giving as much information as possible.

Incidentally, my grandson did this for me. He made it clear he had told his friend I was funny, not that I looked funny!

LOSER IS A WINNER

On August 8, as the 2020 Olympics came to a close, Charles Fernandez, Guatemala's last remaining athlete at the Olympic village carried his country's flag with pride at the closing ceremony.

The 25-year-old modern pentathlete did not win any medals at these Games, but he has a winning attitude - and a higher purpose for his sport.

"The people of Guatemala are the reason I do what I do in sports," he told Tokyo 2020.

"I am an athlete for this country. I don't compete for myself but for the people. When I am on the podium... I just think of the smiles of these people who suffer every day, who work every day to achieve a better life.

"However, sometimes it is hard for them to develop as human beings due to the violence and corruption in the country."

Charles was born in Dayton, Ohio in the United States to Christian parents, Carlos - who was originally from Guatemala - and Heidi. When he was seven, his parents answered the call to become full-time missionaries in Guatemala and the whole family moved there.

Carlos, himself a modern pentathlete, founded a mission called Welcome to My Father's House. For the past 17 years, this evangelistic ministry has provided education and medical care as well as sports and construction projects for the Mayan population.

"We help them build churches, houses, schools and community centers," explains Charles, who has been a Christian from the time he was a child and is passionate

about being a role model for the community.

Although he has not been as hands-on since turning professional, his heart is still for the mission field.

Once, when he was travelling in Europe, he learned that the Fuego volcano, just 10 miles from his hometown, had erupted. Charles had actually been planning to climb Fuego when he got home that same week.

"We decided to shift our focus from it being a vacation to being a ministry opportunity," he continued. He and his girlfriend Kristen started a GoFundMe page and raised \$2000, which they used to buy food, water and other essential items which were distributed through Father's House.

"It was definitely a huge blessing to be able to help people who were victims of the volcano in any way we could," Charles noted. "These people had literally lost everything."

He was also one of five athletes recruited by the Olympic Committee in Guatemala last summer to build three houses in one of the villages destroyed by the eruption.

"As a Guatemalan, as a Christian, and as a public figure, I wanted to try to create awareness for the

people of Guatemala," he said. "This is not a process that will heal itself overnight."

The modern pentathlon is a grueling one-day endurance competition over five disciplines - fencing, swimming, horse jumping, shooting and running - a skillset that must seem bizarre to anyone who didn't grow up with Tarzan or Erroll Flynn movies.

It is Charles' work as a missionary that inspires him in his role as an athlete.

"My aim as an athlete is to bring hope to them, showing them that anything is possible when you work hard. The two ways

I support the country are different but thank God they fit together in a very special way. This is the reason and motivation for what I do at the Olympics.

"I ask God to give me strength every single day. I know for a fact that without the renewal of my strength through my faith and because of God I would not be the athlete that I am today. That is why I do what I do, to be a light of Christ unto the nations in this sport."

Charles said a personal relationship with Jesus Christ was not something religious but genuine.

"It is not a religious experience. God is not a God who looks for the best of the best, but someone

who looks for the broken-hearted in need of a savior, regardless of your sins and faults.

"My faith in God has always been surrounded by the love and grace He has shown to His children even though we don't deserve it.

"My purpose in life has been to always reflect the love that Christ gave us and serve others selflessly. Being an example of Christ's love on earth through actions has helped me use the platform that I have to inspire others and be a positive change to my country and the people around me.

"The difference is about how you treat others, how you look at adver-

sity, and how you respond to everything that happens around you. This allows me to live a happy life as an athlete knowing that it is not about what you do inside sport but how are you doing it that matters." ●

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
